# News from our Library Director

### Sign-up for a Library card this September!

August marked the beginning of the school year for many local K-12 students. Riverside Public Library provides several excellent online resources for our students to use to be successful during the school year. These resources are available via the "online resources" icon at www.riversideca.gov/library.

BrainFuse HelpNow allows students to interact with live tutors in math, science, reading/writing, and social studies. Skills building is available on many topics for students to receive real-time help. Students can also submit essays and other forms of writing to the 24-hour Writing Lab for feedback. Live tutoring is available every day from 1:00 pm-10:00 pm local time.

MAS Ultra School Edition, Middle Search and Primary Search are grade appropriate research databases providing full text articles covering wide-ranging subject areas and topics, including history, art, science, current events, and more. These databases provide primary source materials for students to use in school assignments.

Britannica School is the go-to site for K-12 research. There are thousands of up to date, curated, and curriculum-relevant articles, images, videos, audio clips, primary sources, maps, research tools, and recommended Web sites. There are three separate databases based on grade level—Elementary, Middle, or High.

These resources are available for free with a Riverside Public Library Card. As September is National Library Card Sign-Up Month, I encourage you to ask all students to sign-up for a Riverside Public Library card to access these online resources and much more. To register visit any of our eight library locations or sign-up online at www.riversideca.gov/library.

# Books from the top shelf review by Carol Nagengast



Mecca by Susan Straight Farrar, Straus & Giroux

Mecca draws its title from the eponymous town in eastern Riverside County as well as from a mecca as a place that attracts a wide variety of people. The novel does not have a central plot or storyline, but rather is a series of "slice of life" episodes in the lives of ordinary, but not typical denizens in and around the county. Each episode could stand on its own but in fact, Susan Straight employs a group of young men - indigenous, Black, Latino - who ride motorcycles and who decide to try out for the California Highway Patrol as the core around which the stories are told. While only one, Johnny Frias who is as close to a main character as there is, becomes an officer, the others and their extended families, some of whom are citizens and some of whom are not, are the protagonists in this amazing account of life for people who live on the margins in SoCal.

Among the many "slices of life" to be found: 1) The Santa Ana winds blow and fires burn in western canyons of the county. Johnny Frias, descended from the earliest indigenous and Mexican inhabitants of California, is the target of racial harassment by fellow officers and those whom he stops for violations. During a fire, he (justifiably), kills and buries a man in the canyon without telling anyone. He spends his spare time for years thereafter both worrying about whether the body will be found and searching for the woman whose life he believes he has saved by committing the crime. 2) A young Black boy sees two white men who are trying to illegally harvest copper from electrical towers near his house burn to death when high winds hit the towers. His father, one of the motorcycle buddies who did not make it to the highway patrol, tries to ensure that Johnny Frias rather than a white cop is the first on the scene, because who is going to believe that a Black man and his boy had nothing to do with the death of two white men? 3) The Santa Ana winds blow on an undocumented indigenous woman from southern Mexico who works as a hotel maid near Palm Desert. Even though she lives carefully to avoid detection and deportation, she suddenly finds an abandoned newborn and has to break the rules. She turns out to be linked to the woman whose life had been saved by Frias years earlier. 4) A young Black athlete is shot to death by a white cop and his grieving father punches out his friend Johnny Frias. There are many more stories, all lived by people of color who face daily threats: ICE, rapacious and racist growers, and other employers, being in the wrong place with the wrong skin color. Everyone has to watch their back. Yet and this is a huge yet, Mecca is a novel filled with family, comradeship, romance, and joy. Straight knows Riverside County well and this is a novel of place as much as of people. I highly recommend it. Just do not look for a traditional plot, with a beginning, a middle, and an end.

We participated in the Summer Reading Program and partnered with RUSD to offer a lunch at the library—a safe and cool space for children to enjoy a free meal and a fun activity.

In the upcoming months, staff will continue to develop library programs that build skills, are engaging, fun, and build a sense of community. Staff will work on developing relationships with nearby organizations, businesses, and schools to inform them about library services. We are ready to serve those who find themselves discovering what Eastside has to offer.

#### **Adult and Family Literacy**

Literacy is impacting lives one student at a time. Literacy staff work hard to resume the program and build it again after Covid, welcoming back existing tutors and students and recruiting new students and tutors. Family Literacy book clubs were added that encouraged families to read selected titles, such as Charlotte's Web, and Matilda, as a family and return to have open discussions as a group. We offered a Read Aloud workshop for parents and caregivers and partnered with RUSD teachers to host a Literacy Day for families at Main Library. We are excited to continue work that gets more students in the door and families to develop a love of reading.
