Anatomy of a Book Sale

In a perfect world, every book donated to a Friends of the Library branch book sale area or to the Friends bookstore would go on the shelf and be sold. End of story. But...this isn't a perfect world and we don't shelve every book that's donated and we don't sell every book that's put up for sale.

It would be lovely if every book donated to us was in saleable condition but sadly that's not true. Some of the books we receive are in bad shape- torn, missing pages, heavily written in or underlined, moldy, stained, etc.,etc., and we have to discard them. But what do we do with books that are in relatively good condition and are saleable but we know from experience won't sell at our usual prices? And also, what do we do with books that linger on our sales shelves for a period of time but for whatever reason, have not yet met up with their forever owner? We sell them, of course, dear reader, or at least try to, at reduced prices.

At our branch FOL sales areas, we use pop-up sales and at the Friends bookstore we use wall sections called Bargain Books behind the desk to present these great books to you at greatly reduced prices. But we don't stop there. For books that stubbornly remain with us, we now have a new venue for large scale book sales: the BUCK A BAG BOOK SALE. That's right- the last Saturday of every month at the Friends bookstore we will hand you a plastic grocery store bag (or as many bags as you like) and you can fill it/them up with as many books as the bag(s) can hold and only pay one dollar per bag.

Don't think these books aren't worth reading just because they're in the Buck a Bag Book Sale. Nothing could be further from the truth. They are worthy books: classics in their fields, older fiction, duplicates, no longer current nonfiction- in short the wide range of human knowledge and creativity and all for the measly sum of one dollar per bag. But don't take my word for it. Check it out for yourself on the last Saturday of every month at the Friends of the Library bookstore, 11 AM to 4 PM.

Happy New Year!!

For 2023 we are welcoming everyone back to the Riverside Public Library. If you have stayed away because of COVID, fines on your account, or you just didn't think the library offers what you need, I encourage you to come visit us this year!

To make it easier for all community members to use the library, we have gone Fine Free! That's right, no fines for overdue materials will be collected, and if you had overdue fines on your account, they have been forgiven. We hope this encourages all residents to come back and enjoy the Riverside Public Library.

ARPA funds will bring some new opportunities for our customers this year. There will be new laptop kiosks added to every location, library pickup lockers installed at the Main Library and three community centers, the launch of an app-based checkout system for customers to check out books on their phone, a significant investment in children's materials, and social work interns deployed to five locations to help customers experiencing mental health challenges.

Over the last six months you may have noticed a few new faces working at our libraries, and we are excited to welcome several more team members, including a new Main Library Supervisor, very soon. Continuing the successful programs from 2022, we are looking forward to increasing the number of programs and activities offered at all library locations. Desks with outlets for customers to plug in laptops and other digital devices were added to the adult areas at the SSgt. Salvador J. Lara Casa Blanca and Arlington Library locations in 2022 and this year we plan to make similar improvements at all locations.

Foundation News

The Riverside Public Library Foundation (RPLF)

The Foundation's Naming Campaign is in full swing. Called "The Literacy Legacy (LL) Program," its proceeds will provide materials and programs in all 8 Riverside public libraries:

Print Books (best sellers; children's books)
E-Books, E-Audiobooks, E-Reference Materials
Technology (computers and laptops; coding workshops)
Adult and Family Literacy Instruction
Classes and Programs for all Ages
Innovation Centers
Spaces for Community Gatherings

The LL Program offers naming opportunities in the new main library: Names on the donor wall (\$1000 or \$2500), on the Children's Stacks (\$5000), on the adult stacks (\$10,000), or on a prominent space (from \$50,000 to \$1,000,000). Names will remain displayed for at least 20 years.

We are grateful for early participants who, in recent months, have donated more than \$800,000 to the Naming Campaign – a great start toward our 5-year goal of \$10 million.

The people of Riverside LOVE the library. In 2011, 85.24% of citizens voted to tax themselves for 20 years in support of the library. And in every year, 1 million patrons visit the Riverside library – the cultural and learning center of our community.

Preschool Storytime attendance has grown to 100 participants every week, with families joining Miss Abby for songs, books, play, dance, and a creative craft. OTL staff received kudos from customers for their creative "passive programming", including an interactive Chicka Chicka Boom Boom display, where families were invited to color the first letter of their name and staff then taped it up on the wall behind the information desk for all to see. Currently, there is an interactive Pete the Cat display and a craft for families. Customers

utilize the study room daily, and seem to enjoy the new online reservation system for reserving the room up to a week in advance. OTL also has a group of teen and adult volunteers that have been incredible in helping staff keep up with shelving and craft preparations. And, last but certainly not least, OTL's Friends of the Library have been hard at work keeping the Friend's Bookstore well stocked with donations from the generous community.
